The Australian and New Zealand troops who stormed ashore at Ari Burnu (now ANZAC Cove), on the 25th April 1915, were the finest troops ever assembled by the Australian Imperial Force and the New Zealand Expeditionary Force...their ill-fated campaign is legend and foundation of our national identity.

The adversity faced at Gallipoli is well known, and just surviving the almost unbearable conditions was in itself, an incredible mark of courage. There were also many acts of self-sacrifice, heroism and tenacity that defied the imagination, and some were honoured with the Empire's highest military honour— the Victoria Cross.

It's simple wording
"FOR VALOUR" was personally

chosen by Queen Victoria for whom the medal is named.

The VC is the only Imperial bravery medal available to all ranks.

The ANZACS were awarded 10 VC's. Eight to Australians, one New Zealander serving in the AIF and one New Zealander.

They lived and fought at a time and place, and in conditions we can barely comprehend. However, one thing shines through these decades since they set a standard we can all aspire to. The ANZAC Spirit.

There are no longer any surviving WW I veterans in Australia.

In 1939, The Torch was passed to our fathers, uncles and aunts who formed the 2nd AIF, the RAN and the RAAF with no less bravery and courage and again confirmed the ANZAC Spirit all over the world.

Since then, that Spirit has been called to action in Korea, Malaya Borneo, Viet Nam, Somalia, Namibia, East Timor, Solomon Islands, Iraq, Arabian Gulf and Afghanistan.

The Memorial to all Australian National Servicemen will be dedicated at the Australian War Memorial in Canberra on 8 Sep 2010.

The Fountain and surrounds is situated on the Eastern side of the main entrance in it's own precinct.

Lest We Forget Work on the site began just after ANZAC Day 2009 and completion will be prior to ANZAC Day 2010. The memorial honours the 212 National Servicemen who

died on Active Service in Malayasia and Viet Nam and commemorates the 287,000 men called up from 1951—1972 for service in the RAN, the Australian Army and the RAAF. The history of National Service will be told on plaques in

the surrounds. The water represents the RAN, the sandstone plinth represents the Army and the sky reflected in the polished black granite represents the RAAF The view from the seating is down ANZAC Parade, over Lake Burley Griffin to Parliament House and the Brindabella Ranges.

The designer is Richard Johnson. The Dedication Service will commence at 1130 hrs in the presence of Her Excellency, the Governor General, Ms Quentin Bryce AC. The parade will assemble from 0900 hrs and step off at 1000 hrs.

Montevideo Maru and LARK Force Services

The annual Remembrance Service for this, Australia's greatest maritime loss of life will be held at Trawool, near Seymour in Victoria at 1030 hrs on Sunday, 25 July 10. A full programme is available from the National Secretary.

A recent Foxtel documentary is available as a 2 dvd set from the Montevideo Maru Memorial Committee, PO Box 173, Neutral Bay NSW 2063 at a cost of \$40.00.

The 2/22nd Bn, 8 Div, AIF, was raised on 22 July 1940 and formed up at Trawool, Victoria embarking for New Britain on 17 April 1941, disembarking at Rabaul on 26 April 1941 to form LARK Force by joining up with local New Guinea Volunteer Rifles, a Coastal Battery, a Anti-Aircraft Battery, elements of the 2/10 Field Ambulance and 17th Anti-tank Battery and later supported by 24 Sqn RAAF. The main task was to defend the aerodromes at Lakunai and Vunakanau

Jap bombing from 1 January '42 caused severe damage and by 22 Jan, 22 Sqn was virtually destroyed. Both sites were blown up and the remaining elements of LARK Force withdrew to the Blanche Bay area to engage the Jap landings.

The US Submarine "Sturgeon" sank the Montevideo Maru with the loss of 1061 Australian and civilian

1061 Australian and civilian POW's on 1 July 1942, en route to Japan.

D V A Notes

AMBULANCE and HOSPITAL

Cover changes are proposed to begin from 1/7/2010 for all eligible Gold and White card holders. The new arrangements will put in place a single arrangement, with each State and Territory, being paid the same amount, in the jurisdictions, The changes will apply to

EMERGENCY and to nonemergency cases—with the exception of the Royal Flying Doctor Service which is funded by the Federal Government.

Private ambulances in WA and TAS will be negotiated separately. There will be no reduction in services.

At present, there are different payment and billing arrangements in every State and Territory, making for a very cumbersome and error prone system for DVA to administer.

Minister Griffin has written to each State and Territory about the current **HOSPITAL** arrangements. Given the context of the current health reform now underway, the Federal Govt intends to extend the existing Hospital Services Arrangements until 30/6/12. Enquiries can be made to DVA:

Letters to the Editor

The first Australian National Flag was unfurled on 3 September 1901. The design was the result of a world -wide competition to secure the need for a National flag, an ensign for the RAN, and a suitable ensign for the Merchant Navy.

Prize money of 200 Pounds was set. Over 32,000 entries were submitted and the 5 eventual winners shared the prize money! Mrs A Dorrington from WA, Mr EJ Nuttall from VIC, Mr I Evans from VIC, Mr L Hawkins from NSW, and Mr W Stevens from New Zealand. All were almost identical designs.

In the upper hoist was the Union Jack, immediately below was the six pointed Federation Star, representing the six States of the Commonwealth of Australia. In the fly of the flag were the five stars of the Southern Cross.



It reflected our Heritage, our Unity within the Commonwealth of Australia, our place in the universe, and our Independence.

In 1903, King Edward approved the design for the Australian flag and the Merchant Navy. Formally called the Commonwealth Blue Ensign and the Commonwealth Red Ensign.

In 1908, the Federation Star became seven points to include the Territories of the Commonwealth and to conform with the star in the Crest of the Australian Coat of Arms.
