### National Sandakan Wreath-Laying Service

Australian War Memorial, Canberra Friday May 27 2011

The National Sandakan Wreath-Laying Service will be held at **11am on Friday 27 May 2011** at the Sandakan Memorial in the grounds of the Australian War Memorial.

The ceremony will commemorate the courage and sacrifice of the Australian soldiers during the Second World War who lost their lives in Sandakan POW camp in North Borneo and in the death marches to Ranau, and will remember the six Australians who managed to escape.

The Wreath-Laying Service will be attended by many Sandakan families, veterans who have survived Sandakan, diplomatic representatives and

ADF representatives. The wonderful Canberra Men's Choir will provide their voices to the service again this year, and we are also lucky to have a piper from the Canberra City Pipes and Drums.

A free tour of the War Memorial will be offered after these events for those who are interested.

# Sandakan POW Families annual dinner and oration: Officer's Mess Duntroon Military Academy 27 May 2011

This year, we are fortunate to be holding our annual Sandakan POW Families dinner in the Officers Mess at Duntroon on the evening of Friday 27 May. Prior to dinner we will also have our third Canberra Sandakan Oration, 'Billy Young and the dead end kids', with guest speaker author Anthony (please see next page for a short bio of Anthony Hill).

This year Duntroon is celebrating its centenary – 100 years of Duntroon. Duntroon Military Academy is responsible for training cadets for service as officers in the Australian Army and Duntroon graduates have led Australian soldiers in every major military campaign in which Australia has been engaged. Recognised as one of the world's leading military colleges, it proudly upholds a famous tradition of training and developing some of the country's most accomplished leaders.

The Changi Chapel, Duntroon Military College: The chapel was originally constructed by prisoners of war in Changi Camp, Singapore Island, in 1944. After the war, it was returned to Australia, erected in the grounds of the Royal Military College and dedicated as a national memorial to all Australian prisoners of war.

### A short Bio....author Anthony Hill

Anthony Hill is an award winning Australian author.
His best-selling books include Soldier Boy, Young Digger,
Animal Heroes, The Burnt Stick, Captain Cook's Apprentice, Lucy's Cat
and the Rainbow Birds, Harriet, Forbidden, River Boy and The Shadow
Dog.

Anthony spent five years as a political journalist at Parliament House, and worked as a television journalist, and press officer with the Australian Public Service, the Australian National University and the National Museum.

In 1989 he was appointed speech-writer to the Governor-General Bill Hayden and his successor Sir William Deane. Working for the Governor-General inspired his best-selling novel Soldier Boy, about 14-year-old Jim Martin, the youngest known Anzac. It led directly two more military books – Young Digger and Animal Heroes. This trial took place in Rabaul in May 1946. Jane was thanked for her contribution to the day by Cr. Rod Fyffe, Mayor, City of Greater Bendigo.


A barbeque lunch followed where many took the opportunity to catch up with other Sandakan relatives and friends. (Report from Frances Newbound)

### Stories from Sandakan - 2/18th Bn. By Kevin Smith

The book Stories from Sandakan - 2/18th Bn, written by Dr Kevin Smith OAM, was launched by Major General Raymond Sharp AO, RFD, ED, Ret'd, former Commander of the 2nd Infantry Division in February 2011.

This book is an account of the 2/18th's experiences during training and during action in Malaya and on Singapore Island. It then focuses on 174 men of the battalion who were sent as prisoners of war from Changi to Sandakan in Borneo, and of whom only seventeen came home. This is Dr Smith's third book about Australian POWs in Borneo. A foreword is written by Mr Merv Blyth, President of the 2/18th Battalion Association. (Source RSL NSW Press Release)

### Borneo Burlesque: A Portal to the Past

Borneo Burlesque was published as a souvenir of happy moments spent in the midst of barbaric and soul-destroying conditions. It tells of the entertainments produced by and for prisoners of war at Sandakan and Kuching POW camps during the Second World War.

A Portal to the Past, a publication of the Office of Australian War Graves (OAWG), tries to capture the essence of the original. It reproduces elements of Borneo Burlesque, with a new foreword and an introduction by Professor Richard Braithwaite, son of Dick Braithwaite, one of the six survivors of Sandakan.

#### SANDAKAN MEMORIAL

We are the heart of what was Sandakan. where pert birds burst the silence with their song and captivated couples walk along neat pathways where dark marches once began.

There are ornamental plants here now: red rows of uniforms stand on parade by little resting places giving shade near rusty relics where the jungle towered as blood and sweat were washed away. The thud of boots transformed the swamp into this pond of mute pink budding tongues protruding from green lily-faces, rising through the mud.

In the pavilion you will see us gaze framed neatly in the past, safe in the mist of the unspeakable, that still persists exploding peace and purpose as it preys, while nightly, the mosquitoes' piercing whines are far off spitfires from the other times.
